The closing date for receipt of abstracts is **Monday, 17<sup>th</sup> December 2012**. Successful applicants will be informed by 4<sup>th</sup> February 2013. The authors of abstracts selected for presentation will be expected to submit completed papers (maximum length 6000 words) by 25<sup>th</sup> March 2013.
