Reading seminar

Theories of Rights

Content presentation

The reading seminar Theories of Rights proposes an in-depth analysis of some of the key theoretical issues related to the concept of rights. Problems such as the conceptual structure of rights, their theoretical justification, the subjects of rights, among others, will be discussed on the basis of selected texts. Human rights, as a specific subgroup of rights, will also be critically discussed in light of some classical criticisms furnished against their mainstream understanding.

The seminars are open to students of all cycles of studies at the Faculty of Law, as well as to Erasmus students. The maximum number of participants is limited to 20. If applications exceed the number of places available, candidates will be selected considering the year of their studies (senior students will be favoured). In order to obtain 2 ECTS, participants will have to pass an oral exam at the end of the course.

The seminars, as well as all the reading materials, will be <u>in English</u>. A good command of the English is therefore a prerequisite for participation. Participants will be expected to read the materials before the beginning of each session.

Time and Place

The reading seminars will take place <u>every Thursday from 17.00h till 19.30h</u>, between October and November 2020. **All meetings will take place via Zoom** (participants will receive the corresponding link in due time).
