Some interesting facts about the (law in) Netherlands

- Hugo Grotius, who laid the foundations for international law, based on natural law, was born in the Netherlands
- The Netherlands is one of the founding members of the European Union and has a long educational tradition in this field of Law
- The International Law programmes are aimed at international students
- Dutch professors are regularly consulted abroad because of their expertise (development constitutional states)

And some more..

- **The Hague** is called the legal capital of the World and is host to many international courts:

the International Court of Justice;

the Permanent Court of Arbitration;

the Yugoslavia War Crimes Tribunal;

the Special Tribunal for Lebanon;

the European judicial and police organizations Eurojust and Europol;

the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW);

the International Criminal Court and more



In general Dutch students are very active next to their studies

- Little trips to Strasbourg (ECHR,EC) or Brussels
- Study trips to European and outside European destinations which combines study related and cultural activities

Daily expenses

What kind of expenses should you expect when coming to the Netherlands?

- Experience has shown that students living and studying in the Netherlands for one year spend between €800 and €1,100 a month.
- An average room in Holland costs somewhere between €300 to €600 a month.
- Some average prices: a cup of coffee/tea in a café: €2, a cheese sandwich: €3, dinner in a typical student restaurant: €10. Most supermarkets offer a variety of brands. It is worth comparing the prices to find the cheapest option.
