## 1. FRIBOURG

Fribourg, or Freiburg in German, is one of Europe's most beautiful and best-preserved medieval towns. Yet the city moves to the beat of its students. With over a third of its population being students, this ancient city is truly young at heart.



Located at the crossroads of the German and French speaking regions of Switzerland, and nestled between Northern and southern Europe, Fribourg is a bridge between cultures and languages.

Fribourg hosts a multitude of festivals and cultural events throughout the year, cafés and restaurants that serve first-class delicacies, and is a veritable sporting paradise. It is easily accessible by road, rail, and air from Geneva, Zurich, Lausanne and the Swiss capital, Bern.

### The University

Fribourg reflects the perfect example of Switzerland's long tradition of unity in diversity. With a strong commitment to international relations, the University is part of several strategic networks and has exchange partnerships with more than 150 universities worldwide.

In the past 15 years, the University's student population has more than doubled. Its students and professors hail from 110 countries. Approximately 45% students speak German as their native language, 35% French, and 20% other languages. Students can study in French and/or German as well as in English in some Master's programs.



The curricula are modular, which allow for specialization, and are spread over three years for Bachelor's degrees with an additional average of 18 months for Master's degrees. PhD's are offered in all disciplines, and doctoral students can network by participation with doctoral programs with national and international partners.

### For One and All

The University ensures that adequate infrastructure is available for all students at all times. There are numerous libraries, reading rooms, computer rooms and a foreign-language media centre on campus. Institutions for social advice, grants, study and career guidance, psychological counselling, a nursery, and spiritual guidance, support the students in their day-to-day life. The AGEF (General Student's Association) helps students find jobs, lodging or even books.

The University Sports Institute offers a range of classes in 30 different sports: The "Mountain and Sports" programme includes activities like snow-shoe walking (at night when there is a full moon), rock climbing on weekends, paddle, etc.: see the programme on: <http://www3.unifr.ch/sportuni/fr/>.

### 3. LANGUAGE POLICY

The official teaching languages of the University are French and German.

Few lectures taught in English are offered but mainly at the Master's level; they hardly exist at the Bachelor's level. The Faculty of Science requires English in addition to French and German.

Students must have sufficient oral and written proficiency in French or German to be able to follow a class taught in one of the two languages. We highly recommend the student to have a B1 level (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) when arriving in Fribourg. An official confirmation of your language level is necessary as well as the evaluation form of the [European Language passport](#) is to be attached to the application form.



#### 3.1. PRE-SEMESTER LANGUAGE COURSE

**Students who attend only English taught classes are obliged to take the pre-semester language course.**

French language course	-Highly recommended for students who attend lectures in French/German -Goal is to refresh French/German knowledge, enable to be exposed to an introduction to the Swiss way of life, to the city of Fribourg and to some Swiss customs

Although the Diploma bears the same name from one University to the other, the way courses are combined is different. The exchange student has to figure out what is expected from her/his home University while away. Are the language classes recognised? Is it the course that will be recognised or the number of credits? The transfer from ECTS – European Credits to “local” credits is the responsibility of the home Institution. (See

The University of Fribourg offers English taught classes mainly at Master's level except in the English Department where the offer is for Bachelor level as well.

## 7. HOW TO FIND THE ENGLISH TAUGHT CLASSES

**Good to know:**

Intensive courses / Conferences in English (Cours intensifs bloc – Block Kurse) are offered and are to be found on the web sites of the Departments. Those are generally taught by guests Professors and the schedule is not always available until the beginning of the semester.

## 8. EXAMS, CREDITS AND TRANSCRIPTS

Students are assessed either by oral or written exams, or by papers.

The credit system is based on the European Credit Transfer System ECTS. One ECTS credit corresponds to a workload of 25 to 30 hours. A degree-seeking student would have 30 ECTS per semester.

Exchange Students usually take less as the teaching and learning is in another language. This has to be discussed prior to departure with the home coordinator.

Each exchange student will receive a Transcript of Records, where all the courses and exams will be listed. Once all results are known, the transcript will be issued (but not before February, 15 for the Fall Semester and July, 15 for the Spring Semester / Academic Year).

## 10. APPLICATION DEADLINES AND PROCESS FOR THE STUDENT

### 10.1. SENDING OF APPLICATION LINK TO THE STUDENT

The IRO will send the online application link to the student by email. This is a personal link, which can be used only once.

### 10.2. ONLINE APPLICATION

The student has to register online within a timeframe. At the end of the online application, a PDF document is created called "Application for a student mobility period".

In order to apply as an exchange student, the student has to send back by postal mail or email to the IRO the following documents:

- **Application Form, signed by the student and by the home coordinator** (*the document is automatically created at the end of the online application*)
- **List of courses** in Fribourg (*to be found in the online application*)
- **Official Transcript** of former records
- **List of courses** attending at the time of the application
- **Language knowledge** confirmation that can be a Letter of Recommendation from a language Teacher with the EU-Language Passport + the evaluation form of the Europass Language passport (*to be found in the online application*)
- **Motivation Letter**
- **Curriculum Vitae (CV)**

Apartis registration (housing) and Language Course Form are optional, but we highly recommend registering for both. The student just needs to fill in the online registration (link is to be found at the end of the online application) without sending back any document.

### 10.3. ANSWER FROM THE IRO – UNIVERSITY OF FRIBOURG TO THE STUDENT

<b>The IRO of the University of Fribourg confirms the placement</b>

Once accepted the student receives **early May** or **early November** by email and by postal mail an official confirmation that includes the **letter of confirmation of acceptance** to the Exchange Programme for Visa purpose.

A "Welcome Guide" which contains all relevant information to prepare the stay in Fribourg will be sent by email during the month of July (for the Academic Year or the Fall Semester) or January (for the Spring Semester). #### 10.4. VISA APPLICATION IS THE SECOND STEP TO UNDERTAKE BY THE STUDENT

- Apply as soon as possible for a visa according to the Swiss regulations in place and join the letter of confirmation sent by the IRO
- Establish a Study plan according to the updated course catalogue (academic year 2018-2019). See chapter 6.

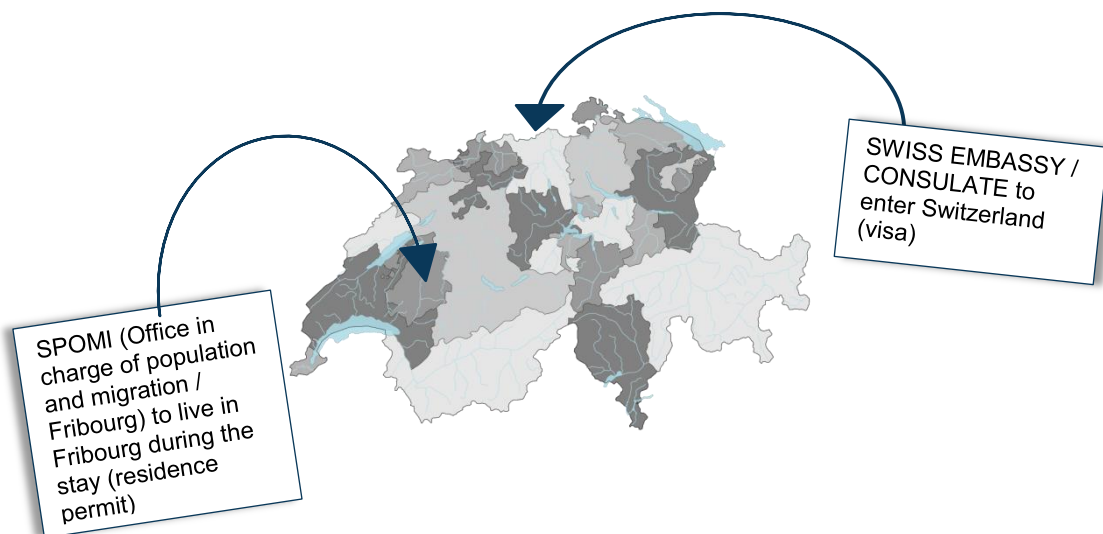
### 11. VISA AND STUDENT RESIDENCE PERMIT

#### 11.1. VISA PROCEDURE FOR NON-EU AND NON-EFTA STUDENTS<sup>1</sup>

Switzerland is a Federal country with 3 layers of government:

- Federal
- Cantonal
- Municipal

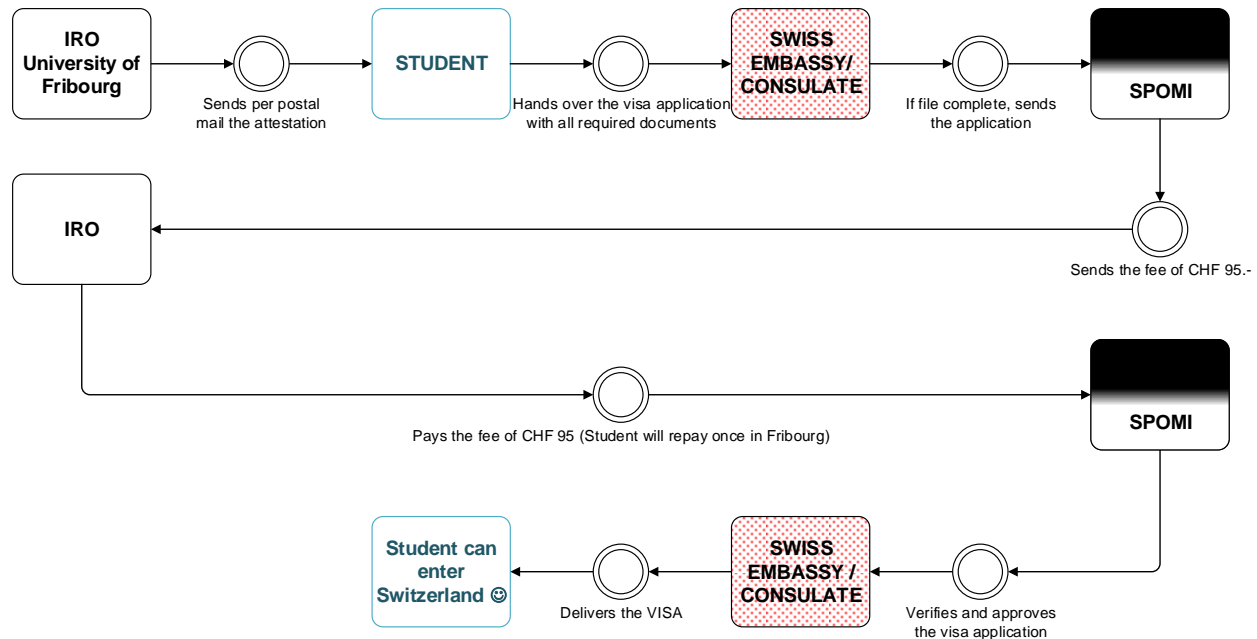
The Visa procedure includes all level

## OVERVIEW OF THE STEPS

VISA procedure can take up to 3 months



According to the procedure, the student applies for the visa at the Embassy or Consulate in the home country. This request is forwarded to the Cantonal authority in Fribourg for approval and then sent back to the Embassy or Consulate with the Cantonal authority's decision.

👉 A fee is requested at the Cantonal level which the University will pay and invoice the student upon arrival (ca. CHF 95.-). 👉

Documents to join to the visa application must be translated in **French** or **German**, even if this is not in writing and clear – **do not submit documents below in English!**

The procedure is the following for the student:



**a. The student prepares the visa application according to the requirements of the Swiss Embassy or Consulate in the home country.**

**b. The student adds the following documents to the visa application of the Embassy:**

1. the letter of confirmation sent by the IRO
2. a letter in which the student commits himself to leave Switzerland after their study period
3. the list of courses for their study period at our University
4. a brief résumé with the schools attended and certificates if any, description of the current studies, the languages learned, and if applies internships and/or professional engagements, etc. It also must include the objectives of the study period which is a **mobility study period**, and that the aim is not to obtain a **University degree or University certificate** at the end of the mobility study period. The stay is within a degree delivered in the home country.
5. a proof of financial resources: CHF 21'900.- for the whole academic year / CHF 10'950.- for a semester. This must be stated via a bank statement in either a Swiss bank or a bank in the home country that has a representation in Switzerland. Please

6. additional documents can be requested by the Swiss Embassy or Consulate

The **SPoMi** (Service de la population et des migrants du Canton de Fribourg) is the Cantonal Authority who will make the decision. On the following [page](#), the student will find the information (French or German) regarding the documents they have to provide with the application.

#### Important information about SPoMi:

- On the homepage of the SPoMi it is specified that: “The documents must be translated in one of our national languages (French or German) and authenticated by the Swiss representation” (see above the recommendation for the visa application).
- The SPoMi confirms that one cannot contact them first, and then only apply for the visa at the Swiss Representation. Visa must be applied at the Embassy or Swiss representation.



#### 11.2. STUDENT RESIDENT PERMIT

<b>All students</b>	The local authorities request each student to have a Student Residence Permit. Upon arrival, students have to process the papers at the Office called the Service de la population et des migrants/Amt für Bevölkerung und Migration (SPOMI). <a href="http://www.admin.fr.ch/spomi">www.admin.fr.ch/spomi</a> (available in French and German).
Please note that the Student Residence Permit does not allow the student to remain longer than the dates for which it has been delivered. Fines can be applied in case of non-respect.

## 12. INSURANCE

## 13. HOUSING

Types of Accommodation

Renting contracts usually start September 1st for the Fall semester and February 1st for the Spring semester. A deposit of 1 to 2 months of the lease is usually charged at the beginning of the lease period and will be refunded at the end under the condition that no damages were made. It is recommended to check carefully upon arrival and have an inventory signed by both parties.

Housing facilities are excellent but one has to book early. The IRO will provide the students a list of housing and it is the student's responsibility to choose the type of housing. There is **no** guarantee for placement in a student hall of residence.

## 14. COST OF LIVING

Living costs are expensive but there are ways to participate in cultural life and sports thanks to the student organisations.

We advise students to budget around CHF 1400 to 1600 p/month. Figures may vary according to the student's personal lifestyle.

<b>Bachelor level</b>	3 years of full-time studies. More information: <a href="http://studies.unifr.ch/en/organisation/structure/">http://studies.unifr.ch/en/organisation/structure/</a>
<b>Master level</b>	1,5 or 2 years of full-time studies (after the Bachelor). More information: <a href="http://studies.unifr.ch/en/organisation/structure/">http://studies.unifr.ch/en/organisation/structure/</a>
<b>Course catalogue</b>	The student is free to establish their own study programme according to the requirements of the home university. There are 2 course catalogues. For the economics faculty: myses / for others faculties: gestens or unifr timetable <a href="https://www3.unifr.ch/timetable/">https://www3.unifr.ch/timetable/</a>
<b>ECTS credits</b>	At the University of Fribourg, 1 ECTS credit is equivalent to 25-30 hours of academic study. The ECTS credits correspond to the amount of time spent for academic work (including the participation in the courses/seminars and the study outside the class hours). The home university is responsible for the credits transfer/recognition.
<b>Canton</b>	Switzerland is made up of 26 states known as Cantons. They are the states that originally united in 1848 to form the Confederation (=Switzerland), to which they each relinquished part of their sovereignty.
<b>SPoMi</b>	Office in charge of population and migration in Fribourg. Office to which student permit must be addressed. Applications only in French or German!
